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Maryland Public School Critical Life-Threatening Incident After-Action Summary

On September 4, 2024 there was an incident within Allegany County Public Schools (ACPS) that met the criteria to be considered a *Critical Life-Threatening Incident* pursuant to Md. Ed. Art. § 7-1510 (g) and COMAR 14.40.05.

Notification [COMAR 14.40.05.04A]

On September 26, 2024 the ACPS staff notified the Maryland Center for School Safety of the incident.

After-Action Meeting [COMAR 14.40.05.04B]

On September 26, 2024 an after-action meeting was held involving school representatives, law enforcement, and a representative from MCSS.

After-Action Report [COMAR 14.40.05.04C]

On December 2, 2024 ACPS submitted an after-action report to MCSS.

Lessons Learned

Based upon the after-action review led by ACPS, the following lessons learned were identified by individuals participating in the after-action meeting:

- Building strong, trusting relationships with students is paramount for creating a
 safe and supportive learning environment. These positive relationships foster open
 communication and encourage students to feel comfortable reporting concerns. In
 this instance, students felt confident enough to disclose the issue after school
 hours, enabling school administrators to promptly contact the suspect's parents.
 This proactive intervention allowed administrators to advise the parents to keep
 their child at home, preventing the potential escalation of the situation and
 ensuring the safety of all students on campus.
- 2. The collaborative investigation between the local education agency and School Resource Officers (SROs) proved instrumental in achieving a successful outcome. By combining their expertise and resources, they conducted a comprehensive and impartial examination of the incident. Open communication and seamless information sharing between educators and law enforcement facilitated a timely



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- 4 and efficient investigation, ultimately contributing to a positive resolution and a safer learning environment for all.
 - 3. School Administrators took the time to properly investigate the incident, which revealed information that may not have been identified in a quick investigation. A thorough and timely investigation is paramount to ensure a complete understanding of the incident and its subsequent proper disposition.

School Safety Recommendations

- 1. This incident emphasizes the importance of students reporting incidents of concern to school administrators and school resource officers (SROs). Additionally, school communities have access to Safe Schools Maryland¹, which provides a mechanism to report school safety concerns.
- 2. School administrators must properly investigate incidents and use information gathered to prevent further incidents. The investigative process requires diligent effort to gather all relevant information, analyze evidence, and identify all contributing factors. A comprehensive investigation allows for appropriate corrective actions to be implemented, prevents future similar occurrences, and provides valuable lessons learned for continuous improvement in safety and operational procedures.
- 3. Schools should cultivate and sustain strong collaborative relationships with first responders, including police, fire, and emergency medical services (EMS), through regular communication and joint training exercises.²
- 4. Local Education Agencies (LEAs) must ensure effective and timely communication of critical information between schools to prevent similar issues from occurring elsewhere.
- 5. The significant rise in anonymous online threats directed at schools in recent years necessitates a critical reassessment and enhancement of school emergency operations plans (EOPs). To effectively address this growing challenge, EOPs must include a dedicated annex specifically outlining policies and procedures for handling such incidents.
